[¶1] The River Street Tree Program is designed to preserve and enhance the urban forest along River Street while supporting the City's goals for a vibrant, pedestrian-friendly, and environmentally resilient neighborhood. By replacing trees impacted by the upcoming infrastructure project and offering new trees to residents, the program will maintain a healthy tree canopy that provides shade, improves air quality, supports wildlife, and contributes to the aesthetic and economic value of the River Street corridor for generations to come.

[Alternative Wording: Lines 3-7] By replacing trees impacted by the upcoming infrastructure project and offering new trees to residents, the program will ~~maintain over time~~ provide a partial tree canopy that provides some shade, improves air quality, supports wildlife, and contributes to the aesthetic and economic value of the River Street corridor for generations to come.

[¶2] The River Street Ad Hoc Committee recommends that the City of Newberg adopt the following policies for a River Street Tree Program.

1. Tree Removal Requirements and Considerations

Remove trees outside of active nesting season to avoid violations of the Migratory Bird Treaty Act.

The city will make an honest effort to preserve as many existing trees as possible, with active oversight of a certified arborist recommended by ODF Urban Forest Division.

20 The urban forest on River Street will be considered infrastructure as it has a bearing on
21 energy usage as well as safety during heat waves.

22 If a large tree can be saved by having a sidewalk curve and cut into a homeowners' yard,
23 the homeowner will be given that choice.

24 City engineers will consult with ODF Urban Forest Division, taking advantage of their
25 program and expertise in making decisions about River Street trees.

26 Consider alternative methods to pave over or around tree roots in order to save trees
27 when possible.

28 1. Tree Replacement & "Trees For Everyone" Program

29 [¶3] To ensure a healthy and inviting tree canopy for future generations of residents
30 and wildlife, the City of Newberg will replace any tree removed or damaged because of the
31 River Street project.

32 [¶4] Additionally, Newberg will offer **one free planter-strip tree, including professional**
33 **installation**, to any River Street homeowner who requests one, provided the location is
34 practical. Replacement trees may need to be planted in a slightly different location than the
35 original tree due to street design and infrastructure constraints.

36 [¶4 Alternative Language] Additionally, Newberg will offer two free planter-strip trees
37 from the approved Trees List, including professional installation, to any River Street
38 homeowner who requests a tree, provided the location is practical. Replacement trees may
39 need to be planted in a slightly different location than the original tree due to street design
40 and infrastructure constraints.

41 Every tree removed will be replaced even if the property has more than two trees
42 removed. The total trees removed will be the minimum total trees replaced. And properties
43 with no trees in front of the sidewalk currently will have the choice of two newly installed
44 trees as part of the 'Trees for Everyone' Program.

45 Tree replacement will prioritize, wherever possible, large caliper trees (4" minimum) for
46 replanting. At minimum two (2) trees on each the East-Side and West-Side street list will be
47 available at a minimum of 4" caliper.

48 [¶Alternative Suggested Language] At LEAST 2 choices of trees from the tree list will be
49 4" caliper or larger. Just before installation, homeowners will be notified which trees are
50 available in a 4" caliper and which trees are only available in a smaller size and then can
51 make their selection accordingly. The more choices available in a 4" caliper or larger, the
52 better for tree diversity along the street.

53 2. Tree Location and Planting Requirements

54 [¶5] To promote healthy tree development and protect street infrastructure from
55 future root-related damage, all new trees will be planted with **subsurface concrete root**

Recommendation for increase to two
(2) trees.

56 **barriers.** These barriers shall be installed during the bike and pedestrian path construction
57 phases.

58 **[¶16]** New tree planting locations (not individual tree selections) must therefore be
59 identified and approved **prior to the start of construction.** Planting areas should avoid
60 unnecessary soil compaction to encourage desirable downward root growth. Gator Bags (or
61 equivalent deep-root watering systems) shall be installed where appropriate.

62 3. Care and Maintenance

63 **[¶17]** The City of Newberg will provide professional landscape maintenance, including
64 regular deep-root watering via Gator Bags (or equivalent), for approximately **four years**
65 after planting. This will ensure successful establishment and proper early growth patterns.

66 **[¶18]** It is recommended that the City consider contracting this work with **CPRD**, as they
67 already maintain Herbert Hoover Park at the entrance to River Street.

68 If a tree planted as part of the River Street Project dies prior to the four years, the City
69 will replace/install the tree as quickly as possible for the homeowner, within four months,
70 and restart the four years of maintenance and watering of that tree.

71 If the city is not caring for /watering trees adequately and a homeowner has to hire help
72 in caring for their trees, or provide that labor themselves, the City will reimburse the cost.

73 4. Tree Type / Species Selection

74 **[¶19]** A **River Street Tree Pick List** will be developed consisting of species specifically
75 approved for River Street conditions. The list should include:

- 76 • Ample “power line friendly” (smaller stature) trees suitable for the east side.
- 77 • A good selection of medium-to-tall trees suitable for the west side.
- 78 • Several attractive flowering/ornamental trees (silver linden, for example).

79 **[¶10]** The Pick List should be created by a citizen ad hoc committee with guidance from
80 a certified arborist who is familiar with Newberg’s climate, soils, and urban conditions.

81 **[¶11] Diversity notes:** Planting an entire street with a single species is strongly
82 discouraged due to disease and pest vulnerability. The final list should aim for an attractive,
83 cohesive overall **aesthetic** (TBD by the committee).

84 **[¶11 Alternative Language] Diversity notes:** The street will have tree diversity. The City
85 will not plant a single species along the entire corridor. This is required due to disease and
86 pest vulnerability. The final list should aim for an attractive, cohesive overall aesthetic (TBD
87 by the committee).

Finalization Notes & Timeline:

- Anticipated finalization expected to occur between 30-70% of final design development.
- Finalization to occur with expert guidance, community input, and design understanding/collaboration with finalized project engineers.

The River Street Tree Pick List will be finalized and approved by the River Street Ad-Hoc Committee, with collaborative input from community members, and relevant experts.

Expert guidance for the final document may include input from horticulturists, arborists, landscape architects, landscape engineers, city planning staff, the City of Newberg Approved Street Tree List, the Oregon Department of Forestry, and will ultimately finalized in collaboration with city selected River Street Project Engineers and associated consultants.

The River Street Approved Tree List is intended to affirm, support and guide both short-term and long-term implementation of the River Street Tree Program Policy, through the identification of tree species appropriate for the unique and specific considerations of River Street, while simultaneously striving to preserve existing tree-infrastructure when possible, support intentionality when replanting is required, and sustain the urban canopy, while simultaneously supporting the city’s goals for a vibrant, pedestrian-friendly, and environmentally resilient neighborhood.

Tree Size Guidance

River Street tree preservation, planning, and long-term maintenance should be in accordance with all information and guidelines as outlined in the River Street Tree Program Policy.

Specific guidance related to tree caliper is as follows: As noted in the primary policy document: At minimum two (2) tree options on both the East-Side and West-Side approved tree lists should be available at a minimum of 4" caliper.
