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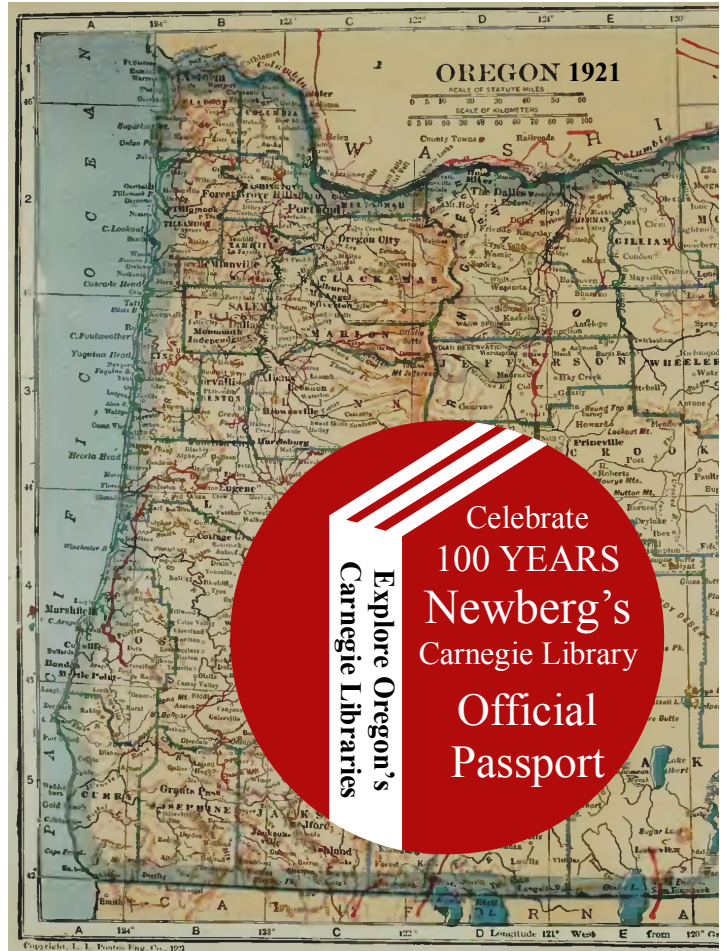
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## Explore Oregon's Carnegie Libraries

### Official passport

The **Newberg Carnegie Library** is celebrating its 100th birthday in 2012, and this passport is part of the centennial celebration.

Did you know that in the early 1900s, Andrew Carnegie helped fund the building of 32 libraries across Oregon and 1,689 in the United States? Newberg's Carnegie Library was built with money from one of those grants. Newberg had opened their first library in a downtown building in 1908. On March 29, 1912, the new Carnegie Library was opened to much celebration.

Celebrate Newberg's Carnegie Library Centennial by visiting other Oregon Carnegie Libraries. Between January 2012 and December 31, 2012, you are encouraged to visit all eight of the Carnegie Libraries featured in this passport. Have each library stamp their featured page and their spot on page 24, and then turn in page 24 to the Newberg Public Library by December 31, 2012 in order to enter a drawing for a fabulous grand prize.

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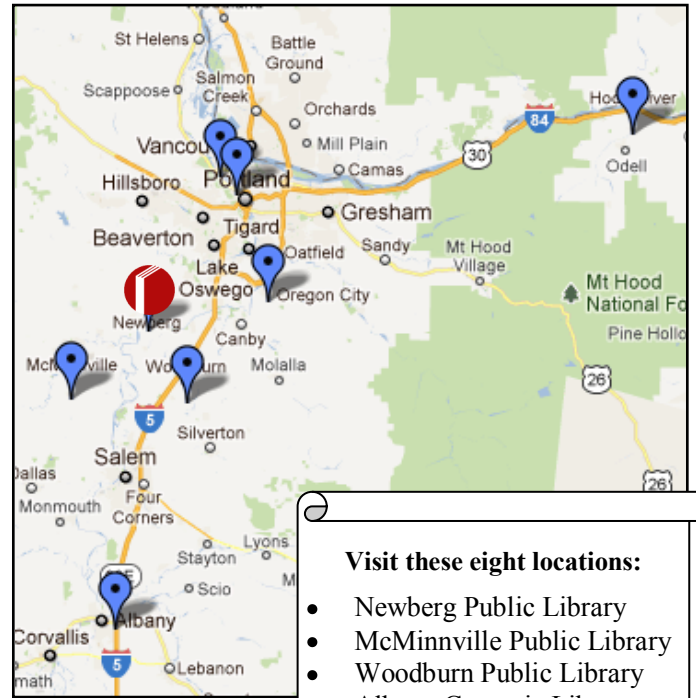

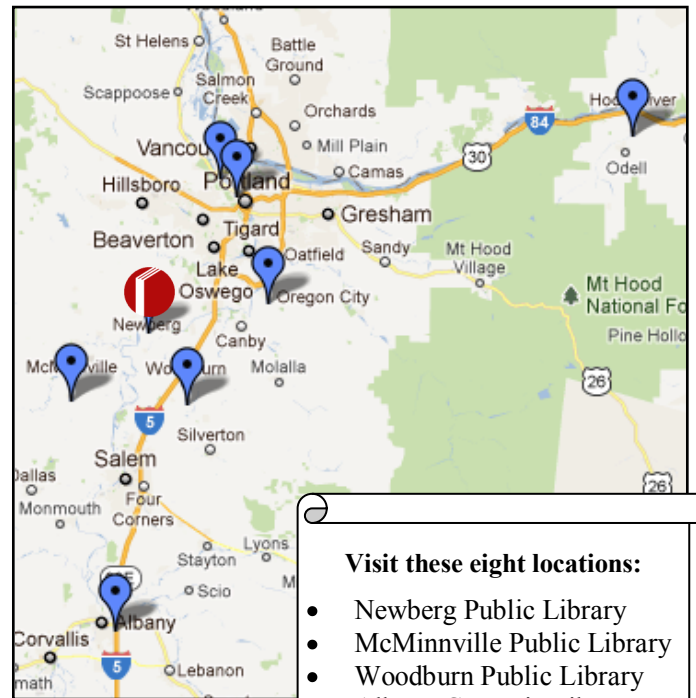

## Carnegie Libraries

Carnegie's method of funding libraries was to build and equip a library, but only if the local government would provide the land and tax support for the continued operation of the library.

In the early 20th century, a Carnegie library was often the most imposing structure in hundreds of small American communities. The architecture of a Carnegie Library was typically simple, but formal. Patrons were welcomed through a prominent doorway, nearly always accessed via a staircase. The entry staircase symbolized a person's elevation by learning.

James Bertram, Carnegie's Secretary, corresponded with every community on their library's design. The letters to the Newberg Carnegie Library board included Bertram's direction to hire a New York architect for the main design and then work with a local architect for the site modifications. The size of the library was based upon population with such things as staircase width determined by the size of the community.

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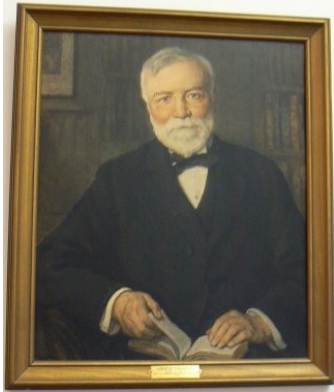

## Andrew Carnegie

b. 11/25/1835  
d. 8/11/1919

Andrew Carnegie was a Scottish born industrialist who emigrated to the United States with his parents in 1848.

He made his fortune in the steel mills of Pennsylvania and was considered the second wealthiest person in America at the time. His personal philosophy was that ones riches should be shared and this led him to become one of the most important philanthropists of his era.

In 1935, to commemorate the centennial of Carnegie's birth, the Carnegie Corporation commissioned the portrait shown above and presented one to each library that Carnegie had funded. This is why you will likely see this portrait somewhere in every Carnegie Library.

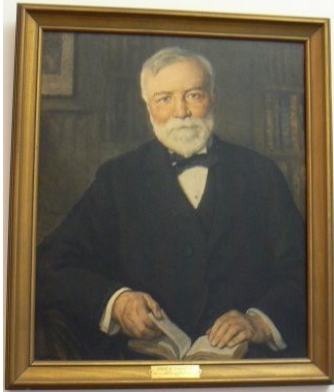

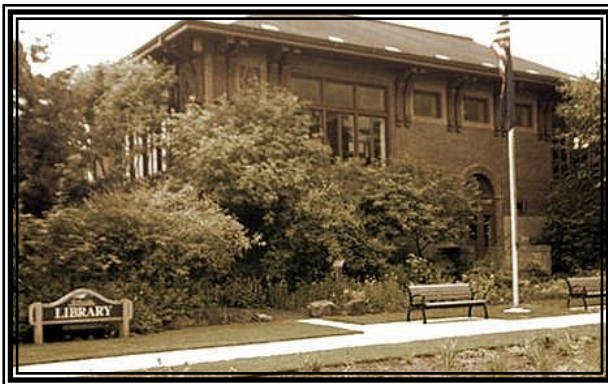

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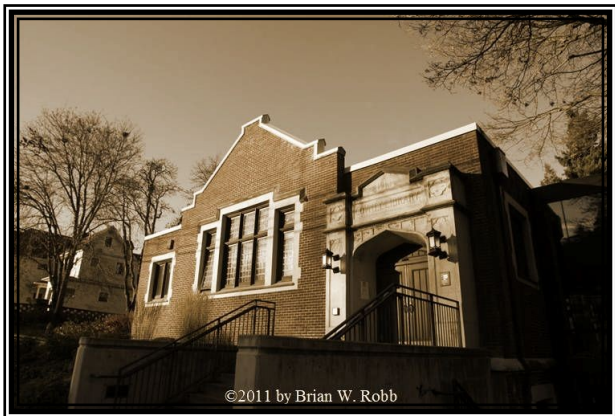
