





by Victoria Gilbert


A series debut finds the heir of a recently renovated book-themed B&B wrongly implicated in the murder of a rare book dealer who claimed the inn was built on stolen funds.

by Arnalour Indridason



by Susan Elia Macneal



by Stuart Neville



by James Patterson



by Laura Levine



The Rocky Road to Ruin



Scandal in Babylon by Barbara Hambly


